### SEEGER FILLS JOHN HANCOCK HALL

At a concert given by Pete Seeger last week, sponsored by the Hughes for Senator campaign committee, there were many, many dissapointed people. These were the patrons who got to the box office too late, only to find out that there were no seats left. Inside it was a different story, and Pete had one of the best singing audiences we have ever heard.

Pete's repetoire was his same comfortable familiar one which still comes to life with his playing and singing, and all the standards which we so often go out of our way not to hear when done by other performers still sparkle and glitter and most important mean something when they are done by Pete. Songs such as "WE SHALL OVERCOME", "DOWN BY THE RIVERSIDE", and "OH MARY, DON'T YOU WEEP DON'T YOU MOAN" were eagerly participated in by the audience. No one has any right to stay quist at a Pete Seeger Concert.

Pete introduced a pair of singers from England who are part of a Group of five who perform under the name of the Spinners. Tony Davis and Mick Groves did "LOWLANDS," I WISH I WERE BACK IN LIVERPOOL" (which we are told is the Spinner theme song) and a Ban the Bomb song which was eloquent in its simplicity.

A bit later Pete was joined by Tony Saletan and Dave Sears to introduce and lead a campaign song for Hughes entitled "STAND UP AND SING OUT FOR HUGHES" done, mind you to the tune of "ROLL ON COLUMBIA, ROLL ON".

NBC took film for TV as part of a show they are doing on Massachusetts Political Campaigns, so those of you who missed this fine concert may still be able to catch some of it on the one eyed monster.


SECOND ANNUAL GOYA FOLK MUSIC & GUITAR FESTIVAL

### FROM THE PUBLISHER

This issue is a particularly important issue for us. With this printing we are one half a year old, though we sure do feel quite a bit older. It would be hard to describe all night mock up sessions and the behind the scene snags that have to be unsnagged to anyone who has not set upon ventures similar to ours. If we had known what we know now beforehand, there might well not have been a BROADSIDE. But we wouldn't quit now.

We are proud of a few things. The people, subscribers and staff who pitched in to help, the fact that we have missed only two publication dates and those only by one day, and that our distribution jumped from 650 copies of a three page dittoed barely legible first issue to what is now a 3000 copy six page photo-offset publication, with one issue that ran 5000 copies and 12 pages long. We thank you for that.

We do wish that more people would take advantage of our issues to run classified ads. Those that have run have been almost 100% successful. We do wish that we would hear more from those of you who would take issue with us or our contributors. We do wish that you would let us know what you would like to see in BROADSIDE.

We have a number of plans for the future. Soon we expect to present a regular cartoon strip, plus a rather hip Coffeehouse ABC book which will be printed serially, (one letter per issue) plus columns on various aspects of folkmusic and coffeehouse activity.

Somewhere in the near future, BROAD-SIDE will be sold instead of given away, because we just cannot operate at this level with the price of printing and paper going up. We promise that the price will be nominal, and that subscribers will not be reassessed.




The TURKSHEAD is in the process of changing hands and at this point there is not much we can tell you about any changes there might be. Next issue maybe.


BROADSIDE HAS MOVED




WTBS PROGRAM HAS NEW NAME
