


JACKIE WASHINGTON RETURNS TO SCHOOL

WE DETEST DIRTY JOURNALISM

From an article SUMMER CAMP CONVERTS by Jack Lotto in the Record American Saturday the 8th, we quote: "Cindy doesn't use a needle, but she's hooked... That's all over for Cindy". The article goes on to state that Cindy has come home with a purpose, Peace. It says her friends think she is now peculiar. And furthermore "Her musical hero, Chubby Checker, is a thing of the past... Now Cindy listens to nothing but pro-Communist folk music, by pro-Red entertainers." The article continues with a blanket charge at the propaganda value of folk songs.

We feel that this is irresponsible journalism, and has a perversion of what we consider freedom of the press. Mr. Lotto has nowhere named a name, or stated a fact. He has instead indicted everyone with an interest in folk music.
