SPOTLIGHTING * SYLVIA MARS

The singing of Sylvia Mars is easily traced to her own roots and the traditions of her race. Sylvia, whose grandfather used to be one of the better down country blues singers in South Carolina, has been singing professionally for six years.

Sylvia has a fine rhythm and blues and folk repertoire vocally, but began her career dancing, a talent she still enjoys. At the age of five she would wait for the mill in her hometown to close for the day, and its whistle was her cue to begin tap dancing on the street corner. The men coming home from work would gather around and throw money down for her, which an older woman with whom she was living would collect in her apron.

She has sung at the Roxbury Freedom House in connection with CORE, for the benefit of the people in Tent City, Tennessee. The satisfactions of singing are not always financial. "My biggest thrill" she says, "was the reception I got from the men at Chelsea Naval Hospital, who in spite of their critical condition, were able to show cheerful gratitude for my entertainment."

Sylvia's professional talents have been illustrated in night clubs, coffee houses, and on several radio and TV programs, as well as political shows hospitals and schools. She has appeared at the Brown Derby, the Hotel Bostonian's Jewel Room, Storyville w/ Lionel Hampton, the Cafe-Lene in Saratoga, and a TV show with Pete Seeger and Sonny Terry, to mention only a few of her numerous appearances.

Sylvia has recently returned from Canada where she did a TV show, (P.M.), in Hamilton, Ontario, and sang at the "Downstairs" Coffeehouse. She plans to start a folk music circuit in Canada, especially throughout Ontario, as she feels the desire for folk music there is great, but undeveloped.

In addition to her musical talents, Sylvia has been writing poems, short stores, and articles since the age of ten. Her specialty is writing pop songs which she publishes under a pen name; her six years of piano and theory study come in handy for this.

Sylvia, a refreshingly charming and sincere person, has recently cut a record album of spirituals, ballads and blues (with Mitch Greenhill and Gordy Edwards) to be released by Folk Lyric in the near future.

1962 NEW ENGLAND FOLK FESTIVAL

The New England Folk Festival will begin at 6:30 Friday evening, April 13, and continue through the weekend to Sunday afternoon. It will be held this year on the grounds of Bridgewater State Collect.

Although in previous years, there has been little in the way of folksinging, this year the program promises more in the folksinging aspects of folk art then ever before. The main emphasis however will remain on the folk dance as it has in previous years. The festival will include booths, of working craftsmen and, of international foods. The dancing demonstrations will include Swedish, English, Irish, Lithuanian, Scottish and Latvian groups.

A Dance Workshop will be held on Sunday from 1:30 to 8:00 PM led by Rod Linnell and Dick Crum.

CANTABRIGIA

We had heard about the Cantabrigia many times before we had visited it. However, we had always thought of it in terms of just another book store. We were pleasantly suprised to find that it is by no means just another book store.

Faith Mattison, the proprietress, was badgered into the opening of a book shop which was intended to cater to the folk dance people in this area, by a number of friends, Although she was apathetic to the idea in the beginning, it soon caught her imagination, and Cantabrigia was born. The usual problems that beset any new venture, and a few

that can happen only to book people were overcome, and to gain experience, Faith served an apprentice-ship with an experienced antiaurain bookman. Now Cantabrigia serves a vast patronage of libraries, public and private, scattered all over the world.

A Browser wandering into the shop at 18 Palmer St., Harvard Sq., would be likely to find a group of folk dancers untangling the intricacies of Slavic dance steps, a discussion of the origin of some obscure ballad or someone with a guitar trying to figure the chord progression of a newly discovered song.

Faith, who is a most personable hostess, enthusiastically joins in any quest her patrons might have. She keeps a large stock of most of the current folk publications, and song books, in both hard and soft covers. It may be possible that you won't find what you were looking for, but it won't be because Faith didn't try. Why don't you drop on up to browse. We think you might just like it.

FOLK FILMS

For groups which are interested in folksong films, there are a large number of such films available to non-profit organizations at no charge through the Canadian Consulate here in Boston.

THE NEW SCENE FOLKLORE

We dropped in on Pete Winters at the New Scene Folklore at 92 West Cedar St., on Beacon Hill about a week ago to drop off a few copies of BROADSIDE and ended up spending a delightful hour talking with Pete and looking over the fine stock of instruments, guitars and banjos that he has on display. Unlike most of the music stores around, Pete is primarily interested in finding and selling older and used instruments, which the informed folk musician is often looking for. New Scene seems to be becoming a folk social center of sorts and lively discussions on the relative merits of some instruments or techniques, as opposed to others are common happenstance.





JUST OFF THE WAX PRESS

TOM RUSH AT THE UNICORN displays the talent of a young folksinger who has a wide range of ability with folk material. Unfortunately, perhaps because we are too familiar with Tom's performances, we don't feel that this is Tom at his best.

However, there is a well balanced selection of songs, ranging from Guthry's PRETTY BOY FLOYD, to the southern white ballad THE OLD 97, and onto a heavier sampling of what are predominantly Negro Blues.

Of the two sides, we like the second best. POOR MAN, Tom's guitar adaption of a Louisiana banjo tune drives hard with a sense of real personal expression. Both, ORPHAN'S BLUES, and JULIE'S BLUES show that he has a greater feeling for this material than do most white singers.

Although this is not Tom Rush at his finest, many people should find this record a valuable addition to their folk libraries, and a good introduction turban folksingers.
