

Many of the people who are aware of Club 47's existence, and many of the members who attend Club functions regularly are unaware of the fact that Club Mount Auburn 47 is a non-profit organization. Upon walking through the door of Club 47, each prospective customer is handed a sheet explaining the philosophy of the Club and memberships available. Due to the fact that a performer is usually on and people are waiting to get in, the full meaning of this sheet is often not understood. The most important statement of all is "Club Mount Auburn 47 is a private, non-profit educational institution organized for the exposition of folk music, classical and modern music, theater, films and an art gallery. All programs are presented in the setting of a coffee house to encourage informality and relaxation among members and performers. Respectful attention to the performer's work is however essential.

After paying twenty-five cents application fee, three types of memberships are available.

1. General Membership: due of one dollar per visit per member and per guest are paid towards a Charter Membership of thirty-five dollars. Payments for guests are credited to members accounts.

2. Sustaining Membership: dues of fifteen dollars if paid immediately or twenty dollars if paid in installments entitle the member to one guest free of charge as he continues to pay towards his Charter Membership.

3. Charter Membership: dues of thirty dollars if paid immediately or thirty-five if paid in installments (see General Membership) entitle the member to attend all Club functions with one guest free of charge. 47's main purpose is not to make money, but to present these art forms to the students

and general public who are members of the Club and to stir up interest among those to whom folk music is a "new frontier" at the least cost possible. We feel that 47's aims and philosophy are admirable and wish them continued success in their efforts.



NEW SCENE ANNOUNCES NEW LINE OF CUSTOM INSTRUMENTS

5 string banjos also.

Previously there have been only two price ranges at which 12 string guitars were available, very cheap and very expensive. New Scene has successfully constructed a fine instrument instrument in a medium price range. This guitar has a Martin Bracing System, Custom Wood Inlays and a choice of Rosettes.

New Scene is also handling an exceptionally fine Italian 12 string guitar which sells for less than one hundred dollars.

Those of you who are interested in picking on twice as many stings should drop in and see about ordering. Since all of them, except the Italian are custom, it will take about a week for completion.



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

"A little bit of heaven (Irish)" will settle over the Boston Arts Festival when the Clancy Boys and Tommy Makem take over the Festival's Main Stage for a fourth of July celebration, Wednesday, July 4 at 9:30 p.m. in the Public Garden. This youthful folk singing group will climax the two day holiday festivities which mark the Festival's observance of the 4th. An Internation Folk Dance Evening will be staged on the 3rd (Tuesday, July 3) by Alan Smith and a group of ethnic dancers. Dancing in the streets will take place both evenings.

The Clancy Boys and Tommy Makem, in a relatively short time, have found their place in this country's concert and night club circles and will be coming to Boston directly from the Seattle World's Fair where their music and song captivated hundreds of thousands. Later this summer, they will go on to be a part of the Edinburgh Festival.

The four young men specialize in authentic Irish Folk songs dating back to the 19th century. The three brothers; Liam, Tom and Patrick have been active in the entertainment of data since birth. The youngest, Liam, studiat the National College of Arts in Dublin where he became interested in folk songs and started to collect folk music throughout Ireland and Scotland before coming to the United States in 1956. He started acting professionally in 1957 at the Poet's Theatre in Cambridge.

Brother Tom has been most active as an actor appearing with Orson Wells in "King Lear" Siobhan McKenna in "St. Joan", and Helen Hayes in "A Touch of the Poet". He has appeared in many major television dramatic programs. The oldest member of the Clancy Brothers, Patrick, is the most travelled member of the family, and among his diversified jobs have been: cab driver, brewery foreman, diamond hunter, insurance salesman and painter. He formed the now very successful Tradition Record Company in 1956.

Tommy Makem comes from a family of musical performers. His mother was a folk singer and his father a traditional fiddler, piper and drummer. By the time Tommy was 15, he had formed his own Ceili (Irish Country Dance) band, and two years later progressed to top pop dance band vocalist. He came to the United States in 1955, and made his debut as a folk singer at a midnight concert in the "Circle in the Square" (New York City). Tommy plays pipes with the group.

The Festival's Fourth of July celebration will include pipe bands, fiddlers and callers, along with an array of fireworks and spectacles. (News Release; BAF June 1962).




"We are a cosmopolitan group", says Cornell graduate PETER YARROW, "It would be dishonest for us to imitate the folk singing style of any particular ethnic group. But our urban background is an asset. We can present in a modern musical form the feelings of many ethnic groups, and do it with integrity. With their lean, intense looks, the trio might belong to the hills of Scotland, Tennessee, or the Balkans. Actually, MARY ALLIN TRAVERS was born in Louisville, Ky., and PAUL STOOKEY grew up in Birmingham, Mich., before they converged on PETER's native New York City. Life-long interests in folk music led all three to Greenwich Village, where AL GROSSMAN, Manager of Odetta, put them together as a trio. PETER was appearing a as a single after his own successful tour that included "Newport Folk Festival, 1960", the "Gate of Horn" in Chicago, and the "Ash Grove" in Los Angeles. PAUL was doing stand-up comic routines in the Village, "a lot of sound effects with virtually no plot". PAUL was helping MARY get back on her feet as a singer after going down with Mort Sahl in a Broadway flop called "The Next President'.

"Al had the idea long before he had us," say PAUL. "He believes the American people will buy pure beauty and dedication, that this vacuum exists in American, and

a lot of people want it filled.

The group hardly feels they have reached pure beauty yet, but they do have dedication. They spent seven months in the crucible working up their initial repetoire of 18 numbers, with the help of Milton Okun (formerly with Harry Belafonte) to polish their arrangements.

What they have achieved is a rare artistic empathy that results from their knowing




themselves, knowing their music, and releasing the natural qualities of both uninhibited by gimmicks. Whether the song requires the big, driving rhythm of a spiritual or the structure as complex as a Bach fugue, one ringing voice or the colorations of a choir, they have found resources for it without artificiality or strain. They have learned the secret of singing so closely together, passing one another in amazing changes, that they build towering harmonic facades filling the auditory spectrum.

They achieve this by regular talk sessions as strenuous as their rehearsals, in which they try to reach a song's philosophic implications before translating it musically. And, because their musical education has been more creative than formal, they have achieved a natural instinct for surpassing rules without breaking them. In these "crucible" sessions they strike a balance between PETER, who is never satisfield, and PAUL's eagerness for new material.

And what about MARY, the statuesque gamin whose voice can exude Chanel No. 5 or myrrh with a smouldery set of emotions beyond her years?

"I do the unexpected", says MARY, with a fine toss of her feminine perogative.

BALLAD & BANJO DEBUT

What we feel is a new concept in presenting folk entertainment in this area will e its unveiling tonight, Friday, June 29th. The BALLAD & BANJO on Barnstable Road, Hyannis, Cape Cod has arranged a summer's program which covers a wide scope of folk music available in this country. They will present performers whose music ranges from the super slick pop folk form to the harsh ruggedness of the Guthrie Disciples; from the dulcet distaff to the twang of the country musicians. The singers will not only include some of Boston's favorite local performers, but will headline with some of the biggest name performers in the country. Speaking with Miss Terri Turner, we were told that the BALLAD & BANJO would try to increase and create interest in Folk Music, with the hopes that enough interest would be engendered to warrant the rebirth of a Festival of Folk Music such as Newport had promised to be.

The BALLAD & BANJO will be divided into two rooms, one of which will be used to present the formal concerts in the evening, and aller one which will be the setting for informal afternoon concerts which will be hosted by THE ISLANDERS, and conducted along the lines of a Hootenany. The atmosphere of the Club will be like that of a coffeehouse with a refreshment bar and facilities for a shop dealing with folk instruments, supplies and records. The Club is within five minutes walking distance of the center of town, but will also have parking facilities for well over 700 cars. It will seat 500 guests; this limitation being decided upon to retain an intimacy between audience and artist. SAAB in cooperation with the festival is providing a special showcar to ferry performers back and forth.

One interesting note is that CHIP MONCK who designed the lighting for the VILLAGE GATE in New York City has also designed the light for the BALLAD & BANJO. PETER, PAUL, and MARY will open the season, starting tonight, June 29th and extending through the following Friday: THE BROADSIDE extends a hearty welcome to the BALLAD & BANJO, and hopes that their venture will prove successful.


NEW RECORD AVAILABLE

TRUST FUND MARKS SIXTH YEAR


In April of 1956, the Guthrie Children's Trust Fund was initiated through the efforts of Woody's friends. At that time, Woody's illness, Huntington's Chorea, had begun to make it impossible for Woody to function properly and hospitalization was necessary. As such, the Fund was created to look after the interests of Woody and to make an effort to bring the works of Woody to the widest possible audience. The Trust Fund follows the legal practices as proscribed by laws of the State of New York.

A few weeks after its creation, Woody
Guthrie legally assigned to The Fund, the
rights to all of his works; music and literary, published and unpublished. The Fund
is now the owner of all such works and is
authorized to license, assign, collect royalties, negotiate and to protect these works,
by the power of attourney in behalf of Woody
Guthrie. The Trustees are Louis Gordon,
a union official, Harold Leventhal, personal
and concert manager, and Pete Seeger, folksinger. The Trustees do not receive any
monetary compensation and their time and
services are rendered free.


THE WOODY GUTHRIE NEWSLETTER

BOUND FOR GLORY, Woody's autobiography was released by Doubleday as a paperback.

A year ago Woody was transferred from the New Jersey State Hospital to the Brooklyn Hospital at his own request in order to be nearer his family. Although he does manage to spend weekends out of the hospital, his condition remains unchanged and shows no improvement.


